

# November 2023 Newsletter



Welcome to the November newsletter, and what has been another very busy month in school! There has been a great deal to celebrate this month and we hope you enjoy reading about the many events that have been happening in school.

#### **8 Billion Ideas Competition**

You may recall that the children in Class 4 entered a competition open to Year 5 and 6 children in all primary schools under the Borough Council of King's Lynn and West Norfolk. This was called '8 Billion Ideas'. The competition was for teams of children to design, make and pitch a prototype of an eco-friendly, sustainable idea that will benefit our local area in the future. It encouraged teamwork, creativity and consideration of the future needs of society.



Last Friday morning, there was a live screening via Zoom of the entries and winners. We were delighted that our team 'Green Ride' came an impressive third place with their prototype of a car that turns waste into energy! The judges were especially impressed by the quality of the pitch. Huge congratulations to Charlotte, Hope, Rosie and Amelia. Their efforts have earned a £50 voucher for the school to be used for teaching resources relating to climate change and £10 vouchers for the children. Here is their design.



# **Children in Need**

On Friday 17<sup>th</sup> November, we held a non-uniform day to support this year's Children in Need appeal. Thank you to the members of the School Council who collected money on the day. In total we raised a super £111.80 – an amazing effort! Thank you for helping us to support such a good cause. #### **Remembrance**

In early November, the School Council members sold poppy merchandise to raise money for the Royal British Legion. We then marked Remembrance in school with a special assembly to explain to the children the importance of the poppy. Grace (Class 4) and her brother Leo (Class 1) laid a poppy wreath on behalf of the school at the memorial in Denver on Remembrance Sunday. This was particularly poignant for both children as their dad is a serving member of the armed forces and is currently away from home on a tour of duty.



We also welcomed a special visitor, Trigger the poppy horse, who wore a blanket covered in beautiful poppies. Trigger's visit helped the children to understand that it was not only people who died in wartime, but also animals – in fact a staggering eight million horses, donkeys and mules were killed during the First World War. The children really enjoyed meeting Trigger and I know the visit made remembrance more special to them.



#### **Odd Socks Day**

On Monday 13<sup>th</sup> November, we organised an Odd Socks Day to mark the start of Anti-Bullying Week. The children were all asked to come to school wearing odd socks to represent the fact that we are all unique individuals. Well done to all the children for promoting this very important message.







# **Visitor for Anti-bullying Week**

To mark the importance of anti-bullying week, in addition to Odd Socks Day, we received a visit from Louise of the Swan Youth Project. Louise came to lead a special assembly 'Making a noise about bullying'. She discussed with the children the difference between banter and bullying, how to recognise bullying and most importantly, what to do if you or someone else is being bullied.



## DT Day Class 3 – A Safari through Robotics

On 17<sup>th</sup> November Class 3 (Year 3 and Year 4) children had a 'A Safari through Robotics'. Ben Allen, who is part of the University of the West of England, visited and brought along a collection of devices and robots which help improve people's lives. After trying them out the children were then asked to think about their own ideas for 'robot helpers'. The children then presented them to a panel of judges including Ben and Sarah Dungay, one of the school's Governors. Each child got a certificate of participation, and the winners got a trophy.

#### **Foodbank Visit**

On Thursday 16<sup>th</sup> November, some members of our School Council visited Downham Market Foodbank to deliver the items we had collected in our Harvest celebrations. They had a tour of the foodbank and learnt about how it supports local families. Amber, Mia and Emie wrote the following account:

Firstly, we went in and added our donations to the storage. We asked some questions. They gave us lanyards of volunteers who work there: Mia was Lisa, Emie was Brian and Amber was Jeanette. We weighed some food that was already there. We had to sort through things that couldn't be used e.g. out of date foods. These items are given out for free. We had a tour around the main hall, and we were shown how much pasta and cereal they have donated — a lot! They had lots of posters about the foodbank and the importance of them in this current climate. They explained how people get to use the foodbanks. Most people have to go to the foodbank, but in some cases they will deliver the food. Then we went into a room, a little like a mini supermarket, and we had to follow some instructions to make up a parcel for a family (a 4-year-old, an 8-year-old and 2 adults) finding the food from the shelves. We had to make it fair for the family. We had to wear aprons whilst doing this. We all really enjoyed visiting the foodbank — it was a fun experience — we also got chocolates at the end. We learnt that a range of people who are struggling use the foodbank and we have a better understanding of how our donations help families.

The children really enjoyed the visit and it really helped them to understand how their donations are used to support local families. It linked in well with our Christian theme for this term, generosity. A huge thank you to Downham Market Food bank for welcoming us.

On Tuesday 28<sup>th</sup> November, we held our second SEND coffee morning of the school year in school. We are continually working hard to improve school attendance due to the impact that absence from school can have on learning. As part of this work, each newsletter throughout the year has had an attendance focus.

#### **Oudoor Learning Updates from Mr Cawley**

In outdoor learning have been exploring teamwork and dexterity! Some of us were busy making spider's webs, whilst others took on the 'lock and key' challenge; an activity where we had to lock our arms around a rope and travel the length of it - all without touching the floor (some even tried it blindfold!) This activity separated the leaders from the lemmings! Whether or not they were successful or needed a little more practise, it was an apt way of concluding class two's 'no pen day' through a final opportunity of task rich in communication completing opportunities!

In another outdoor learning session we took some clay outside and printed some of the fantastic leaves we found on the floor. This lasted all of 5 minutes, so the children used their imaginations to print other things in the clay such as the letters on the side of the tyres. Quite surprisingly we managed to find most of the letters of the alphabet from the words written on the tyre walls! Obviously, this was not planned but was inspired by the children's enthusiasm for the session! We also played another game of 'lock and key', where the children relied on their friends to help them from one end of the rope to the other end of the rope without touching the floor. They really enjoyed this game and some of the innovative ways they find to do this never cease to surprise the adults. With a rope lying there it was inevitable that we finished the session with a game of tug of war. This allowed us to throw questions at the children about fairness and equality whilst keeping it fun and giving them a competitive edge to finish the session... Until next time, Mr C.



Outdoor learning club took a turn for the 'chillier', as it was Baltic on the field this week! We decided to split the session into two, the first half concentrating on making numbers to 20 with natural resources. It never ceases to amaze me how well the children work together and in fairness we got most of the numbers quite quickly. As the sky darkened, we broke out the glow sticks for the second half of the session and had a few games of manhunt. This is a cross between hide and seek and tag. The glow sticks added a layer of extra fun, and it wasn't long before even the youngest children got the idea of the game, and all were able to join in. Hopefully we didn't keep parents waiting too long at the gate, but as always, the children didn't want to leave! Next week our in our last session, we will have a fire... watch this space!

#### **Sports News**

#### **Cluster Football**

On Thursday 9<sup>th</sup> November, two teams representing Denver travelled to Hillcrest Primary School to take part in a 6-a-side football tournament against other schools in the cluster. #### **Cross Country**

On Thursday 9<sup>th</sup> November, children who had qualified with a top ten finish in the Downham cluster cross country tournament travelled to Lynnsport to compete in the area finals. Many children took part in this round and our children all ran fantastically well.





A top ten place for Chase in Class 3 and Ella in Class 4 saw them through to the county finals. They both ran extremely well and with Chase coming 26<sup>th</sup> and Ella 35<sup>th</sup> out of approximately 70 runners in each of their races. A huge thank you to the parents and carers who took the time to take the children to these events.

#### Young Leaders Training - Class 4

The children in Class 4 recently completed their Young Leader training. In their final session, the groups had to consider how to keep the interest of the people they are leading (communication) and how to use equipment effectively. This was achieved by asking the groups to work together to invent a game with a specific amount of equipment and time available. Groups were also asked to consider which equipment was strictly necessary to deliver the game. Once the groups had spent time testing out their games, they pitched and demonstrated them.



Feedback was given by Shaun and members of the other groups regarding safety considerations and how to get people back involved in the game if they have been caught out so that they don't get bored. Many of the ideas were so good that they are to be rolled out to after school clubs and for playground games.

Beyond this, the skills and ideas explored throughout the training programme will be used to develop activities at playtimes, and support the planning of and organisation of festivals, inter-competitions and sports days. The children have been encouraged to use these skills in the wider community. They have a number of stars to work towards filling in to continually improve their playmaker skills.



# **National Football League Under 11s Competition**

On Thursday 16<sup>th</sup> November, a team of 6 plus 2 substitutes travelled to Lynnsport to take part in the National Football League Under 11s mixed tournament.
