Dear parents/carers,

Please find enclosed a pack of resources to help with your child's learning at home while school is closed.

Where possible, the work is based on current topics and the children will be familiar with the processes and strategies to complete many of the tasks.

I have sought to offer ideas for the children's continued learning in terms of practical tasks and activities that do not require significant time or resources to prepare. In both Reception and Year 1, particularly in Numeracy, practical activities are just as beneficial as written tasks. However, any amount of practise with regards number and letter formation is also useful. Of course, it is always worth encouraging your child to experiment with writing, drawing and painting.

One of the most useful things your child can do is to maintain consistent reading habits. To this end, I have included additional reading material and would like to further stress the importance of developing a positive culture of reading at home, sharing stories with your child and giving them the opportunity to read to you. Additionally, regular practise of word/sound "fans" will also be of great use.

You will find in your pack ideas and work relating to Numeracy and Phonics, in addition to information to further our current topic based around the season of Spring. Below you will find a list of websites that are useful for home-based learning in the context of Numeracy, Literacy and Phonics.
